#### August 14 Paint Recycle with the City of Regina

The 14 August 2004 waste paint collection was the fourth of six planned events of the 2004 program year in Regina. The Paint It Recycled program, one of the City of Regina's Waste Minimization Programs, is in its 12th operational year and is the largest in the province of Saskatchewan.

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The August collection event was moved forward to the second week in August to accommodate a special event at the Southland Mall on the 3rd Saturday. Nevertheless, the event was very well attended. The volume of vehicles processed was 425 and included a large number of half-ton trucks with large individual loads. In addition, eleven (11) oil-based gaylords were processed. The amount of latex paint will be determined after it is processed at the Regina Landfill. However, the rolloff container was loaded to the top.

During the event we handed out 400 standard Paint It Recycled information leaflets [ran-out] and 425 brochures from the Regina Scale Modellers Club. In addition, 425 Southland Mall shopping certificates were also distributed. The August event was a beautiful, warm to hot summer day. The volunteers consumed all of the bottled water before the end of the event. By noon the heat was tiring for the volunteers.

The Regina Scale Modellers [3rd event] and the Street Culture Project [15th event] were the main volunteer groups. NewAlta provided 1 staff person and 2 volunteers to deal with the heavy workload. The August event is always staffed with the more experienced volunteers to be able to cope with the heavy traffic volumes. SaskTel also provided one safety officer and vehicle to assist and supervise some of the volunteers.

We started the day at 7:00 a.m. collecting safety equipment and setting up the collection site at the Southland Mall. The roll-off container [for latex paint and empty metal paint cans] was dropped off at the site late on Friday evening by the Regina Landfill staff. The coffee was pre-arranged for delivery on site which saved about 30 minutes of work-time. NewAlta also brought the gaylords and pallets directly to the site. The Southland Mall maintenance manager and security staff cordoned off the collection and provided some extra barricades on Friday evening. Most of the volunteers arrived between 7:45 and 8:15 a.m. Safety training and material-handling training was completed before 8:25 am when we started to process the vehicles.

Typical with most previous events, there was a line-up of about 15 cars before we started the line processing. The volunteers took the established average of about 20-30 minutes to develop an efficient vehicle processing procedure. We started processing 2 vehicles at a time [warm-up period] and then expanded to 4 vehicles at a time. For brief periods, up to 5 vehicles were processed. Work was VERY busy throughout the whole morning and few volunteers had the opportunity to rest or take their coffee. Processing 4 vehicles per minute was the average and is very efficient over a four-hour period.

At times the queue line extended off-site and onto Albert Street South with vehicles coming in off the Chapters entrance. Later, some vehicles attempted to blend into the line by coming across the parking lot in front of Wal-Mart. This created some traffic confusion, however, the Mall security officer was able to re-direct the traffic back onto the Chapters entrance - this extra effort was appreciated by both the volunteers and many of the vehicles in the queue line. The volunteers worked extremely hard and fast between 9:30 and 12:00 noon but were not able to reduce the line-up. The volunteers, despite being quite hot and tired, elected to stay on-site for an extra 30 minutes to complete the paint clean up. Almost all citizens were appreciative of the hard work on the volunteers and there were very few complaints about the wait. At the peak times the queue line wait was about 30 minutes with most vehicles waiting about 10-12 minutes to deposit their waste residential paint.

The volunteers were very careful in the paint screening and this made it possible to again reduce household hazardous waste to a very low level this month. The amount of aerosol cans was about average with 2 barrels being filled. Most household hazardous wastes noted were glues. Very few glass containers were encountered, therefore, it is assumed the newspaper advertisement is effective.

An above average number of persons attempted to "jump the queue line" at the Southland Mall site and were politely turned away by the volunteers. This was also the case at the Northgate Mall in April and May 2004. This appears to be a growing trend at these events. The volunteers were processing 4-5 vehicles per minute - this results from working VERY fast and cannot be increased. In addition, 4 hours of work is the physical limit of the volunteers. To control the line, to be fair to all vehicles, to control household hazardous waste and for safety considerations - all reasonable measures are taken to avoid persons jumping the queue line. This trend will be monitored for the remainder of 2004. At the end of the event we were able to fill eleven (11) gaylords with oil-based paint. Each gaylords holds about 130 one-gallon cans (11 X 130 = 1430 cans). The first gaylord was filled at 9:00 a.m. Again, we put 27 big (1 gallon) cans into one level in the gaylord. Every gaylord included five levels. Four levels were filled with big cans the fifth level was always a mixture between small cans and small paint containers.

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Statistics on the amount of latex paint will not be available until it is sorted and hardened at the Regina Landfill later in August. The roll-off container was completely full of latex paint cans, so the amount of latex paint is expected to be high. A final statistic will be completed at year-end.

The collected aerosol paint cans [average] were sorted onsite and placed into 2.drums for processing by NewAlta. Two minor spills of paint occurred at this event. One incident was the result of a loose lid and one incident was an accident by a volunteer. A supply of paint absorbent granular material was available to clean up the pavement. One citizen had some paint leak inside her truck - some paint absorbent was placed on the spill and she was advised to get it attended to.

All sorted empty cans and the Latex Paint went into the City's landfill roll-off container. This diverted paint will be mixed with the Latex Hardener during the next few weeks. The Street Culture Kidz (Regina) are under contract to process the waste latex paint and to sort out metal paint cans for recycling at IPSCO. Further performance management testing of the latex paint hardener product will again be conducted in 2003. The goals will be: (1) document an efficient handling process, (2) obtain complete latex diversion statistics, (3) establish units processed per person per hour and unit costs, (4) and test the amounts of hardener required to harden different amounts of paint.

During the whole event refreshments (hot coffee and donuts @ approx. \$68) were offered to the volunteers. Some water was bought for some of the younger volunteers. The entire site was clear and clean and the oil-paint gaylords were removed before 2:00 p.m. Some last minute "stragglers" delayed the shutdown slightly. The rolloff container was collected later in the afternoon and transported to the Regina Landfill for processing.

Regarding demographics for this paint event, the majority of the public was again between 25-50 years of age and viewed as upper-middle class. Several half-ton trucks had collected paint from the houses in the neighbourhood and brought it all in one vehicle. In general, it was an average type of crowd to be processed. The paint tended to have a wide range of age from very old to relatively new. A high majority of the paint was not suitable for re-use. Many people commented about cleaning out their basements.

Very strong media interest [Global-TV and CTV] was experienced, two on-site interviews were given and the Paint It Recycled event was broadcast that evening on both channels.



In addition to what Dwight has mentioned, we also managed to pick up a non-RSM volunteer, Merv Weiss. He told me that he and his wife had just purchased some pieces of antique furniture, and he was hoping that the general public would bring some thinners, strippers and stains by that he could use to help reduce his costs when it came time to refinish. When he left he had about 3 or 4 large boxes of product that he loaded into the back of his station wagon.
